Parasha tidbits from the Rabbi

"וְהָעָרִים אֲשֶׁר תַּתְּנוּ שֵׁשׁ עָרֵי מִקְלָט תַּהְיָנָה לָכֶםאֵלֶה הַדְּבָרִים אֲשֶׁר דָבֵּר מֹשֶׁהֹ אֶל־כָּל־יִשְׂרָאֵלִי" (Devarim 1:1) "These are the words which Moshe spoke to all of Israel..." The opening words of this week's sedrah emphasize the power of speech — specifically, the speech of Moshe Rabbeinu, as he simultaneously rebukes and teaches the Jewish people before their entry into the Promised Land, the Land of Israel. We know that Moshe was not a man of words, and yet here he delivers a lengthy and exemplary address. The Rambam notes this phenomenon as containing "eternal teachings." The Lubavitcher Rebbe explains that Moshe's words were divinely inspired—expressed through the mouth of a mortal human being. This teaches us that each Jew possesses the potential to bring out the divine power of speech, a power that transcends generations. We must all learn from the mistakes of the past and strive to transform them into a positive path forward. This, in essence, is what Moshe Rabbeinu expected of Bnei Yisrael.

Parasha thought from Rabbi Arthur Kirsch

In this week's *parsha*, we start the fifth portion of the Torah. It's called *Mishneh Torah*, where Moshe, in the year 2488 — five weeks before the seventh of Adar — tells off *Klal Yisroel* in a nice, *bekovodik* way. He reminds them how they challenged him throughout the 40 years in the desert. At this point, they're fighting the Amorites on the east side of the Jordan. Moshe comes and sees Og, acting like the security, sitting on the wall. The *Medrash* says his legs were hanging over — 18 *amos* long, around 27 feet — a pretty scary guy. But of course, we go to battle with Hashem on our side. Og's *zechus* of telling Avrohom about Lot being captured wasn't enough to save him. Moshe stepped in, took control, and was victorious.
