Parasha tidbits from the Rabbi

״וּסְפַּרְתָּם לָּכֶםׂ מִמְּחֲרַת הַשַּׁבָּׁת״ (Vayikra 23:15) "And you shall count from the day after the day of rest" The Yalkut Yitzchak teaches that immediately after we count the Omer each night, we say:

"הרחמן הוא יחזיר לנו עבודת בית המקדש למקומה במהרה בימינו" "May the Merciful One restore the service of the Holy Temple to its place, speedily in our days." This is because, according to the Torah, the mitzvah of Sefirat HaOmer can only be fulfilled in the context of the Temple, where the Omer offering was brought. In our times, when the Beit Hamikdash no longer stands, the mitzvah is fulfilled m'derabanan—by rabbinic decree—in remembrance of the Temple service. Therefore, we pray for the rebuilding of the Beit Hamikdash, so that we may once again fulfill the mitzvah of Sefirat HaOmer m'doraita—according to Torah law. May this take place speedily in our days.

Parasha thought from Rabbi Arthur Kirsch

In the middle of the parsha, while discussing the Moadim (holidays), the Torah introduces a verse about leket, shikchah, and pe'ah—the agricultural gifts to the poor. It tells the owner of a field to leave a portion at the corners for the aniyim (poor people). You might think that when the poor come to collect it, you should go out and help them cut it or give them bags to carry it—but Rashi explains: No! Just leave it for them. Why can't you help them? Because it no longer belongs to you. You are merely a steward. It already belongs to the poor. This should be our attitude with all tzedakah: We are only stewards. It does not truly belong to us. Everything in this world belongs to HaKadosh Baruch Hu. If He sees fit to bless us with "extra money," then we must see ourselves as stewards or guardians of those funds. In the Talmud, this role is referred to as an "apotropos"—a trustee. The money is entrusted to us for the sake of future tzedakah opportunities that will arise throughout life. When someone approaches you in shul or elsewhere, it is not a burden but an opportunity to give tzedakah—and one should give with a smile.
