Parasha tidbits from the Rabbi

"You shall observe the Festival of Sukkot for seven days, when you gather in your produce from the field." The Rashbam teaches: When you gather in the produce of the land and your houses are filled with all good things—grain, wine, and oil—then you shall dwell in Sukkot (booths), so that you will remember that I made the Children of Israel dwell in booths in the wilderness for forty years, without settlement and without inheritance. From this, you will offer thanks to the One who has given you an inheritance and homes filled with goodness, and you will not say in your heart, "My own strength and the might of my hand have produced this wealth for me." In addition, we learn in Likutei Torah: The word lulav (לולב) is composed of two parts: לו־לב "to Him, a heart". This hints that one should direct one's entire heart to Him — to the Holy One, blessed be He.

Shabbat Shalom/ Moadim L' simcha

Parasha Thought from Rabbi Arthur Kirsch z"I (This D'var Torah was received from the hospital last Friday. Due to the Yom Tov bulletin schedule, it was not published last week and is being shared now.)

We are at the end of the year, and the last day of the year is a very important time. You can decide to take on Torah, to do chesed, or to strengthen your tefillah. The last day of the year is so, so important — because it has the power to change your entire outlook for the coming year. You can make a decision, and the Ribono Shel Olam doesn't want anyone to die. The Ribono Shel Olam wants everyone to live. And if you choose to do something special — it becomes a tremendous zechus. Whether it's doing chesed for others, learning a little more Torah, or deepening your tefillah, you are showing the Ribono Shel Olam where your heart is. Show Him what you're doing with Daf Yomi, how you're preparing for Shabbos, how much you care. The last day of the year — וואס קאנצעט צום יאָר — is truly a key moment. It closes out the year, and it can change everything. The Ribono Shel Olam sees you in a different light — a totally different light — when you make that sincere effort. So now, try. Try to do something special. Not just for yourself, but for the Ribono Shel Olam. And when He sees that you're trying to do something for Him, He will help you — He will help you do something for yourself as well. And you will be zocheh to a gut gebentsht yor — a good and blessed year. Remember: the last day of the year is very important. Don't waste it.
